The Bike Pump Track - Victory Park

We are thrilled to announce the rebuild of the bike pump track has been scheduled to start on Monday 27th January. This has been made possible by you – our fabulous community – hitting and then smashing our Crowdfunder campaign target. What an awesome demonstration of community support and effort! It has touched us all at the council, and we can't wait to get the new track built and used by a community which has played such a crucial part in making it happen. You deserve it!

We offer another big thank you to everyone who donated to the campaign, who gave us rewards to encourage people to donate, who shared the campaign details or who simply spoke kindly about the project and helped spread the word. You all played a part – thank you!

And we have another exciting announcement! A grant application made some time before our Crowdfunder campaign has also been successful. This new grant is from Enovert Community Trust and comes from landfill tax credits. We know how fierce competition is for these limited funds, so we are thrilled our application was successful. The track will now have all the features and landscaping we want.

And we'd like to again thank our other grant funders - and remind you of them: Gloucestershire Community Foundation, Gloucestershire County Council's Build Back Better Councillor Fund, Renishaw plc, Sport England, The Community Infrastructure Levy, Tesco and Co-op.

Special thanks also go to the family and friends of North Vernon-White for a donation in his memory and to Louie Gibbons for instigating the non-uniform day at Archway School.

This is what we expect the track will look like. It will consist of two parts - a jump line with start mound and return line along with a separate pump track suitable for all ages and abilities. The design makes best use of the available space and will sit comfortably in the landscape. We are excited to see it take shape!

Elm Road Playground -

While delivering the new bike pump track has taken a huge amount of our time and attention, we have not forgotten the playground at Elm Road Playing Fields is in need of replacing and users have been waiting some time for this to happen.

We are still in the process of completing tender documents to go on the government portal for contractors to bid on. This has proved to be a more complicated and time-consuming process than anticipated, but we are not too far off from getting these documents ready.

There will then be a period of four to six weeks to accept bids and design schemes from contractors and to clarify what each is offering before making the decision on who will be awarded the contract. We already have the budget put aside (£45,000) so as soon as a contractor is chosen, we can schedule the work to begin.

All being well, Elm Road should have its new playground in the spring. Thank you for your patience.



Ashway Court Playground -

As soon as the Elm Road contract is in hand we will start working on the renovation of the playground at Ashway Court, Cainscross.

Ongoing issues with fly tipping in open spaces...

Tipping a mattress, electrical items or a bin bag full of rubbish in the street or in an open space causes a nuisance and makes an area look ugly and run down. Uncontrolled illegal waste disposal can be hazardous to the public, especially if it contains toxic material or asbestos. There could be a risk of damage to watercourses and soil quality from dumped waste.

In 2016/17 more than one million incidences of fly-tipping were dealt with by councils in England. The estimated cost of clearing up this waste was over £58 million. Fly-tipping is a criminal offence for which you can be prosecuted. *Source (keepbritaintidy.org)*

THE CAINSCROSS WALKS AND TREE SPOTTERS GUIDE

Councillors are currently in the process of producing a set of 4 free colour leaflets of local walks with links to online support and resources for tree spotters who happen to find themselves in Cainscross. If this interests you then please read on, as we would very much welcome your views and comments.

Whilst we would be delighted to receive comments from experts, such as the Arboricultural Association, it would be wonderful to receive comments from aspiring tree spotters too. Your views matter to us!

The plan, includes four walks in the parish, one for each of the four wards of Cainscross Town Council: **Ebley, Cashes Green West, Cashes Green East and Cainscross**. The brochure will provide a coloured map with each walk identified by a different colour: red, yellow, green and blue (as picture below).

Brief guides to each walk and a challenge for you to identify trees that you might encounter on the walks will also be included. We are fortunate to have some wonderful trees in our parish and surrounding areas - you will be able to view, review or simply just enjoy being with them.

We are still designing the brochure and would welcome suggestions, especially some artwork which might appear on the front and rear panels. If you should wish us to consider your creations for inclusion in the brochure or on our website then please contact Cainscross Town Council staff and we will happy to help. Our emblem is a kingfisher - so perhaps it would be nice to see that, and of course we need to encourage walkers and tree spotters too.

We don't demand that everyone is a 'tree spotter' who follows the guides and walks - the walks will be open to one and all.

Sadly, we have yet to identify routes which are wheelchair accessible so if you would like to help us do so then please get in touch. - **Councillor Gavin Lindsay**
